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ICANN Board Reaffirms Commitment to Open Second Application Window for Generic Top-Level Domain Program

Marina del Rey, California... ICANN's Board of Directors has passed a resolution reaffirming the organization's commitment to open a second round of applications for the New generic Top-Level Domains (gTLDs) Program as expeditiously as possible.

"The important thing here is that the Board has erased any doubt that there will be a second application window for new generic Top-Level Domains," said Steve Crocker, ICANN Board Chair. "It's not yet possible to set a definitive date for the next application period, but that will be determined after the current window closes."

The current window for new gTLD applicants opened on 12 January and will close on 12 April. After the window closes, ICANN will then begin processing and evaluating the applications. The amount of time needed to complete the stage will depend on the total number of applications received.

ICANN has committed to assess trademark protections and other technical issues before proceeding with a subsequent round of gTLD applications. The Board resolution directs ICANN to create and publish a work plan describing the assessments needed before the second application round may open. That plan would then go before for the ICANN community for refinement.
